President's Report 2016

After serving on the WildResearch Board in various positions since we initiated the organization just over 6-years ago, the time has come for me to resign from the Board. It has truly been a huge honor to be involved with growing the organization from the ground up, and a fantastic experience to see WildResearch grow to what it is today. I am very pleased that the organization is in a great position for continued successes and growth, with four developed research programs, a strong membership and dedicated core group of volunteers and committee members, secured funding for our programs, including multi-year funding for our Iona Island Bird Observatory flagship program, an experienced Board that each contributed to Strategic Planning, a well-established flagship fundraiser viewing pelagic seabirds rarely seen from shore, and long-term endowment fund that continued to grow in 2016 thanks to a grant from the Fairmont Vancouver Airport,

I have thoroughly enjoyed my involvement with WildResearch, most of all, building and growing the WildResearch community. The dedication and support shown from the membership has been inspirational – the organization is the people. With another year in review, here's a summary of what WE as an organization, have accomplished this year.

Now in its 7th year of operation, WildResearch's flagship program, the Iona Island Bird Observatory (IIBO), continued to run our annual spring and fall migration monitoring programs with excellence in 2016. Through these programs, WildResearch provided training to 90 volunteers that contributed 2,146 volunteer hours towards IIBO (the equivalent of 54 full weeks of work at 40hrs per week!!) and provided educational demonstrations to 11 visiting groups including Girl Guides of Canada, Nature Kids, UBC, BCIT, Fraser Valley University and the Fairmont Vancouver Airport's Sustainability Committee. Capture highlights for 2016 included a Palm Warbler this fall and a Virginia Rail and Sora in the spring. This fall the IIBO program also supported the successful completion of member Natasha Pirani's MSc. practicum through Royal Roads University. We were pleased for Natasha's pleasant presence at IIBO this fall, her quick draw with the camera, and all the photos she captured of volunteers and birds alike. A BIG thank you to The Sitka Foundation for major financial contributions that funded the Spring and Fall Migration Monitoring Program and allowed contracting our seasonal staff, including extraordinarily hard working Banders-in-Charge, Andrew Huang, Azim Shariff, Dan Froehlich, and Paul Levesque, and Banding Assistants, Sarah Nathan and Kiirsti Owen. Additional funding to run IIBO was generously provided by the City of Richmond and BC Nature and BC Naturalists' Foundation. Thanks also to volunteer coordinators Renae Mackas, Angela Bond, Mikaela Davis, and to Metro Vancouver Regional Park's Melanie Blendell, Markus Merkins, and Robyn Worcester for their role in making IIBO a resounding success.

The once BC focused WildResearch Nightjar Survey Program continued to spread its wings in 2016, with an expansion to five additional provinces and territories across Canada to now include survey routes across British Columbia Alberta, Saskatchewan, New Brunswick, the Yukon, and Northwest Territories. Led by Program Manager, Elly Knight, and Regional Coordinators Paul Preston, Gabriel & Amanda Foley, Virginia & Alex Noble-Dalton, Andrea Sidler, and Rhiannon Pankratz, WildResearch enlisted the support from the over 135 volunteers that completed over 253 survey routes across the country. This program's data contributions and research focus continues to lead the way in terms of our knowledge of three nightjar species with ranges throughout the study area including Common Poorwill, Common Nighthawk, and Eastern Whip-Poor-Will. Results will be presented in the 2016 Nightjar Survey Annual Report and in peer-reviewed papers that are currently underway. This year,

WildResearch also participated in national meetings to discuss standardized nightjar protocols, released an online data atlas hosted by the Community Mapping Network, hosted 8 survey orientation sessions for 51 participants across the country, and continued partnership with University of Alberta's Bioacoustic Unit, and sustained correspondence with nightjar volunteers through production of a bi-monthly nightjar e-newsletter! TD Friends of the Environment, Canada Summer Jobs Program, and The Nature Trust of British Columbia kindly provided funding for running this program in 2016. We sincerely thank Bird Studies Canada, the Breeding Bird Survey, our program coordinator employee, Alessandra Hood, and many naturalists groups for their support in promoting and participating in our Nightjar Survey program across the country.

This year the WildResearch Butterfly Program expanded its reach by establishing and building relationships with other like-minded organizations across the Lower Mainland. We kicked off the program by hosting our Annual Butterfly Identification Workshop in conjunction with Metro Vancouver Regional Park at Campbell Valley Regional Park in Langley. Program Manager, Renae Mackas also attended several events to promote learning about butterflies at the following events: Environmental Youth Alliance – Native Pollinators, Citizen Science Program Workshops, and the City of Surrey's Environmental Extravaganza, Metro Vancouver Regional Park's Annual Butterfly Tea Party at Campbell Valley Regional Park, and the UBC Botanical Garden's Garden Days. Additionally, Renae organized and led butterfly group surveys to complete WildResearch's 5-year commitment to the BC Butterfly Atlas inventory program in local parks. Through all the outreach and survey events, we estimate that the Butterfly Program reached over 600 butterfly enthusiasts this year!

In 2015 we initiated an Adopt-a-(Cooper's) hawk nest monitoring pilot projects, and in 2016, the program evolved into the program 'Cooper's Hawks in the City', under the direction of WildResearch Director, Jay Brogan. Rather than focus on monitoring the success of individual nests, as the Adopt-a-(Cooper's) Hawk Nest program was aimed at, the Cooper's Hawk in the City Program is aimed at estimating the relative abundance of the Cooper's Hawk, in Metro Vancouver. As top predators, raptor species like to Cooper's Hawk are often one of the first species to be affected by a range of environmental pressures and can provide a cost-effective means of detecting environmental change. Understanding their relative abundance is the first step to studying potential environmental pressures, and thanks to the 10 volunteers that assisted with surveys in 2016, this work is underway.

The WildResearch newsletter, skill-advancing workshops, and regular social events continue to unite our community. Led by WildResearch Director, Virginia Noble, the newsletter provides our membership with an opportunity to share their conservation science interests and initiatives, and stay in touch with upcoming events and news. We sincerely thank all the members that have contributed content to the e-newsletter over the last year, especially Angela Bond, who provided content for the employment, volunteer, and academic opportunities section of the newsletter each week. Despite a few wet trips, the ever-popular Winter Bird Identification Field Trips, led by WildResearch Director, Jay Brogan, hosted a record number of participants this year. One of the highlights of our trips as observing a Bohemian Waxwing spotted by Dr. John Reynolds during the Christmas Bird Count and WildResearch trip at Iona Beach Regional Park, hearing raptor identification by wing loading thanks to WildResearch member, Paul Levesque, and learning from well-known birder, Tom Plath, during the Reifel Bird Sanctuary trip alongside NatureKids, Vancouver Chapter. Our Members' Services Committee (MSC) has been working hard to provide exceptional administrative assistance to our members, as well as organizing seasonal social events including the annual Bird Bag Making Party, kindly hosted by Idiko Szabo's, and the Annual Volunteer Appreciation Party.

It is with great admiration and appreciation that I extend a heartfelt thank you to our membership and supporters in 2016, as well as over the last 6-year of my appointment with WildResearch. It has been a great pleasure to lead the organization as President, while working towards a significant and common goal of leading conservation initiatives. I very much look forward to watching WildResearch continue to grow as an organization and will continue to support and cheer on the organization as a Life Member of the organization.
